1 General information

Kruger Products L.P. (KPLP or the Partnership) is a limited partnership registered in the Province of Quebec, Canada whose partners are Kruger Inc. (ultimate parent), KPGP Inc. (KPGP), and KP Tissue Inc. (KPT). The Partnership manufactures, sells and distributes tissue products for household, industrial and commercial use. The Partnership has plants in New Westminster, British Columbia; Crabtree, Quebec; Sherbrooke, Quebec; Gatineau, Quebec; Scarborough and Trenton, Ontario and Memphis, Tennessee. The Partnership's headquarters are located in Mississauga, Ontario, Canada.

2 Basis of presentation

These unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) applicable to the preparation of interim financial statements, including International Accounting Standard (IAS) 34 - Interim Financial Reporting as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB), and with interpretations of the International Financial Reporting Committee which the Canadian Accounting Standards Board has approved for incorporation into Part 1 of the CPA Canada Handbook - Accounting. These unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements should be read in conjunction with the annual consolidated financial statements of the Partnership for the year ended December 31, 2018.

The 3-month period ended March 31, 2019 represents the 90 day period from January 1 to March 31, 2019 and the 3-month period ended April 1, 2018 represents the 91 day period from January 1 to April 1, 2018.

These unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements were approved by the board of directors of KPGP on May 9, 2019.

3 Summary of significant accounting policies

The Partnership adopted IFRS 15, Revenue from Contracts with Customers on January 1, 2018 using the modified retrospective approach. The adoption of this standard had no significant impact on the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements of the Partnership. The application of IFRS 15 resulted in a change in the Partnership's revenue recognition related to dispensers and related revenue. The Partnership recorded a transitional adjustment of \$6.3 million in the deficit, to reduce the balance related to the dispensers recorded in Other long term assets at December 31, 2017.

The significant accounting policies that have been used in the preparation of these unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements are described in the annual consolidated financial statements of the Partnership for the year ended December 31, 2018 and have been applied to all periods presented except the following accounting policies, which were adopted effective January 1, 2019.

- (i) IAS 19, Employee Benefits. In February 2018, the IASB issued an amendment in connection with defined benefit plans and accounting for plan amendments, settlements or curtailments. The mandatory effective date was for annual periods beginning on or after January 1, 2019. The amended standard had no impact on the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements.
- (ii) IAS 23, Borrowing Costs. In December 2017, the IASB issued Annual Improvements to IFRS Standards 2015-2017 Cycle, which includes an amendment to IAS 23, Borrowing Costs. The amendment clarifies borrowing costs eligible for capitalization. The mandatory effective date was for annual periods beginning on or after January 1, 2019. The amended standard had no impact on the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements.
- (iii) IAS 28, Interests in Associates and Joint Ventures. In February 2018, the IASB issued an amendment to clarify that an entity applies IFRS 9, including its impairment requirements, to long term interests in an associate or joint venture to which the equity method is not applied. The mandatory effective date was for annual periods beginning

on or after January 1, 2019. The amended standard had no impact on the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements.

(iv) Effective January 1, 2019, the Partnership adopted IFRS 16 Leases, using the full retrospective approach. Under this approach all comparative period information has been restated to reflect the adoption of IFRS 16. An opening statement of financial position at the beginning of the earliest comparative period, January 1, 2018, is presented, as is a restated statement of financial position at December 31, 2018. Impacts on the unaudited condensed consolidated statement of comprehensive income (loss) and the unaudited condensed consolidated statement of cash flows are disclosed in note 20.

IFRS 16 establishes principles on how to recognize, measure, present and disclose leases. The standard provides a single lessee accounting model, requiring lessees to recognize assets and liabilities for all major leases. IFRS 16 superseded the current lease recognition guidance, including IAS 17 Leases and the related interpretations, when it became effective.

The primary changes to lease accounting as a result of adopting IFRS 16 include the following:

- The definition of a lease has changed under the new standard. Under IFRS 16, a contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. Previously, the Partnership determined at contract inception whether an arrangement is or contains a lease under IFRIC 4:
- Under IFRS 16, the lessee recognizes a right-of-use asset and a lease liability upon lease commencement for leases with a lease term of greater than one year. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at the amount of the lease liability plus any initial direct costs incurred by the lessee. Subsequent measurement is determined based on the nature of the underlying asset. The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments payable over the lease term and discounted at the implied lease rate. If the implied lease rate cannot be readily determined, the lessee uses its incremental borrowing rate. Subsequent re-measurement is required under specific circumstances.

Previously, the Partnership classified leases as operating or finance leases based on its assessment of whether the lease transferred significantly all of the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of the underlying asset to the Partnership;

- IFRS 16 provides detailed guidance on determining the lease term when the Partnership has an option to extend the lease; and
- The new standard includes extensive disclosure requirements that differ from previous requirements.

At inception of a contract, the Partnership assesses whether a contract is, or contains, a lease based on whether the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

The Partnership recognizes a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured based on the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated to the earlier of the end of their useful life or the lease term using the straight-line method as this most closely reflects the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits. The lease term includes periods covered by an option to extend if the Partnership is reasonably

certain to exercise that option. Lease terms range from 1 to 25 years for land, buildings, equipment and motor vehicles. In addition, the right-of-use asset is periodically reduced by impairment losses, if any, and adjusted for certain remeasurements of the lease liability.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Partnership's incremental borrowing rate. Generally, the Partnership uses its incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate. Variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or rate are not included in the measurement of the lease liability.

The lease liability is measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method. It is remeasured when there is a change in future lease payments arising from a change in an index or rate, if there is a change in the Partnership's estimate of the amount expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee, or if the Partnership changes its assessment of whether it will exercise a purchase, extension or termination option.

When the lease liability is remeasured in this way, a corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset, or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

The Partnership has elected to present right-of-use assets separately from property, plant and equipment and lease liabilities are presented under current and non-current liabilities in the unaudited condensed consolidated statement of financial position.

At the inception of the lease, the Partnership records the right-of-use asset based on the corresponding lease liability over the term of the lease. Right-of-use assets of \$94.2 million and lease obligations of \$115.1 million were recorded as of January 1, 2019, adjusted for \$2.8 million of lease payments made at or before January 1, 2019, with a \$23.7 million net impact on the deficit. When measuring lease liabilities, the Partnership discounted lease payments using its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date. The weighted-average rate applied is 4.61% at March 31, 2019.

The Partnership has elected not to recognize right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short-term leases of property, plant and equipment that have a lease term of 12 months or less, and leases of low-value assets, such as certain office equipment. The Partnership recognizes the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term in the unaudited condensed consolidated statement of comprehensive income (loss).

Payments to suppliers includes payments for leases of low-value assets, payments for short-term leases and variable lease payments not included in the measurement of lease liabilities. Interest paid includes cash payments for the interest portion of lease liabilities.

In applying IFRS 16 upon initial adoption, the Partnership has used the following practical expedients permitted by the standard:

- The Partnership adopted the recognition exemptions permitted for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. The lease payments associated with these leases are recognized as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.
- The Partnership has applied the practical expedient whereby the Partnership is not required to reassess which
 transactions are leases on the date of initial application, as previously assessed under IAS 17 and IFRIC 4.
 The Partnership applied the definition of a lease under IFRS 16 to contracts entered into or changed on or
 after January 1, 2019.

• The Partnership has applied the practical expedient whereby certain classes of underlying assets are not required to separate non-lease components from lease components, and instead account for each lease component and any associated non-lease components within the contract as a single lease component.

The application of IFRS 16 Leases requires significant judgements and certain key estimations to be made.

Critical judgements required in the application of IFRS 16 include the following:

- Identifying whether a contract (or part of a contract) includes a lease;
- Determining whether it is reasonably certain that an extension or termination option will be exercised;
- Determining whether variable payments are in-substance fixed;
- Establishing whether there are multiple leases in an arrangement; and
- Determining the stand-alone selling price of lease and non-lease components.

Key sources of estimation uncertainty in the application of IFRS 16 includes the following:

- Estimating the lease term;
- Determining the appropriate rate to discount lease payments; and
- Assessing whether a right-of-use asset is impaired.

The impact of new standards, amendments to standards and interpretations that have been issued but not yet effective for financial periods beginning on or after January 1, 2020 and have not been early adopted have been discussed in the annual consolidated financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2018, except for the following:

- (i) IAS 1 and IAS 8, Definition of Material. In October 2018, the IASB issued amendments to the definition of material in IAS 1 and IAS 8 and provide guidance to improve consistency in the application of the concept whenever it is used. The mandatory effective date would be annual periods beginning on or after January 1, 2020, with early adoption permitted. The amended standards are not expected to have an impact on the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements.
- (ii) IFRS 3, Definition of a Business. In October 2018, the IASB issued an amendment that revises the definition of a business. The amendment aims to resolve the difficulties that arise when an entity determines whether it has acquired a business or a group of assets. The mandatory effective date would be annual periods beginning on or after January 1, 2020, with early adoption permitted. Management is evaluating the standard and has not yet determined the impact on its unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements.

4 Critical accounting estimates and judgments

The preparation of these unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires the use of estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities in the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements and the disclosure of contingencies at the dates of the unaudited condensed consolidated statements of financial position, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. On a regular basis and with the information available, management reviews its estimates. Actual results could differ from those estimates. When adjustments become necessary, they are reported in earnings in the period in which they occur. The estimates and judgement applied by management that most significantly affect the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements are the same as the ones that applied to the audited consolidated financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2018 except for new significant judgements and key source of estimation uncertainty related to the application of IFRS 16 which are described in note 3. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of revision and the future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The Partnership has made a provision for the potential obligation under a land lease at one of its plant locations to demolish the building and restore the land at the end of the lease to its original condition. The current lease ends in 2028 but an extension is currently being negotiated. The estimated undiscounted amount to settle this obligation would be between \$8.0 million and \$10.5 million. (b) Long-term incentives and DSUs

Long-term incentives include the Executive Long-Term Incentive Plan (LTIP) for the Partnership. The LTIP uses performance share units and results are based primarily on Adjusted EBITDA return on capital employed using a three year average, along with other components. The LTIP is paid in cash in May of the year following the three year period it is earned. The compensation expense is recognized over the same three year period.

The Partnership has adopted a policy that requires that each director own a minimum of 5,000 common shares and/or share equivalents in the form of deferred share units (DSUs) of KPT. A deferred share unit plan (Plan) has been adopted which allows independent directors to receive all or part of their director retainer fees in the form of DSUs. The Plan allows for the issuance of additional units as dividend equivalents when KPT declares and issues a dividend to shareholders. Upon the individual ceasing to be a director, the DSUs will be paid out in cash. As of March 31, 2019, DSUs of \$0.03 million were recorded (December 31, 2018 – \$0.08 million).

The Senior Credit Agreement requires the Restricted Credit Parties to comply with certain financial covenants, including, but not limited to, the maintenance of (i) a ratio of total net funded debt to EBITDA (ii) a ratio of senior secured net funded debt to EBITDA and (iii) an interest coverage ratio. However, KPT incurred a loss for tax purposes for the year ended December 31, 2018 and as a result no Tax Distribution was declared on February 28, 2019. The excess advances over the Tax Distribution were \$1.7 million. Of that amount, \$0.3 million was used to pay the monthly tax instalment on behalf of KPT and is repayable to KPLP on or before March 31, 2020. The remaining \$1.4 million was repaid to KPLP by Kruger Inc. and KPGP during the 3-month period ended March 31, 2019. The advances are non-interest bearing and non-recourse in nature and will be settled when the Tax Distribution is declared annually.

13 Income taxes

The Partnership is not a tax paying entity for the 3-month periods ended March 31, 2019 and April 1, 2018. The income (loss) from the Partnership flows to the partners, Kruger Inc., KPGP, and KPT. However, the Partnership's subsidiaries KP USA, KTG, TAD Canco Inc., GTM, TAD Luxembourg S.A.R.L, KP TAD Holdco Inc., TAD1 Canco I Inc., TAD1 Canco II Inc., TAD1 GP ULC, TAD2 GP ULC, and KPSI are corporate entities and, therefore, are subject to tax.

14 Related party transactions

15 Segment information

Reportable segments

Management has determined the operating segments based on the reports reviewed by the Chief Executive Officer who is considered to be the Chief Operating Decision Maker. The Partnership operates in three industry segments: Consumer, AFH and Other.

(a) Consumer

This segment operates using the Partnership's manufacturing facilities in Canada (New Westminster, British Columbia; Crabtree, Quebec; Sherbrooke, Quebec; Gatineau, Quebec) and in the United States (Memphis, Tennessee). The Consumer segment includes sales of branded tissue products such as CashmereTM, PurexTM, White SwanTM, ScottiesTM, Sponge TowelsTM and White CloudTM and private label tissue products.

(b) AFH

This segment operates using the Partnership's manufacturing facilities in Canada. The AFH business sells tissue products primarily through distributors to businesses involved in property management, health care, food service, manufacturing and lodging and also to public facilities.

(c) Other

This segment includes certain corporate costs of the Partnership and timing adjustments for certain manufacturing costs included in inventory.

The Partnership previously included the profit or loss associated with the sales of parent rolls to other tissue manufacturing companies, primarily in the United States, and sales of recycled fibre, primarily to its parent company in Canada. These profits or losses are now included in Consumer or AFH as appropriate.

Segment operating income is the earnings (loss) for each such segment before (i) interest expense, (ii) income taxes, (iii) depreciation, (iv) amortization, (v) impairment (gain on sale) of non-financial assets, (vi) loss (gain) on disposal of property, plant and equipment, (vii) foreign exchange loss (gain), (viii) costs related to restructuring activities, (ix) changes in amortized cost of Partnership units liability, (x) change in fair value of derivatives, and (xi) one-time consulting costs related to operational transformation initiatives. "Consumer Segment Adjusted EBITDA", "AFH Segment Adjusted EBITDA" and "Other Segment Adjusted EBITDA" means in each case the Segment operating income for the respective reportable segment of KPLP.

The Partnership's assets, operations and employees are located primarily in Canada and the United States. The same long-term assets of the Partnership are used for the Consumer, AFH and Other segments. Accordingly, assets cannot be allocated to these segments.

As of March 31, 2019, the Partnership had foreign exchange swaps outstanding of nil (December 31, 2018 – nil) and foreign exchange forwards outstanding of nil (December 31, 2018 – nil).

Liquidity risk

The Partnership is required to operate within certain quarterly financial covenants. On March 15, 2019, due to significant changes in business conditions since the entering into of the Senior Credit Agreement in April 2018, the Partnership received the unanimous consent of the lenders to make changes to the ratio of total net funded debt to EBITDA covenant and to the ratio of senior secured net funded debt to EBITDA covenant contained in the Senior Credit Agreement. Refer to note 10 for additional information.

Interest rate risk

The Partnership holds interest rate swaps, contracted to fix the interest rate on a notional amount of \$100.0 million at March 31, 2019 (December 31, 2018 – \$100.0 million). The interest rate swaps are maturing during the 3-month period ended March 2020.
