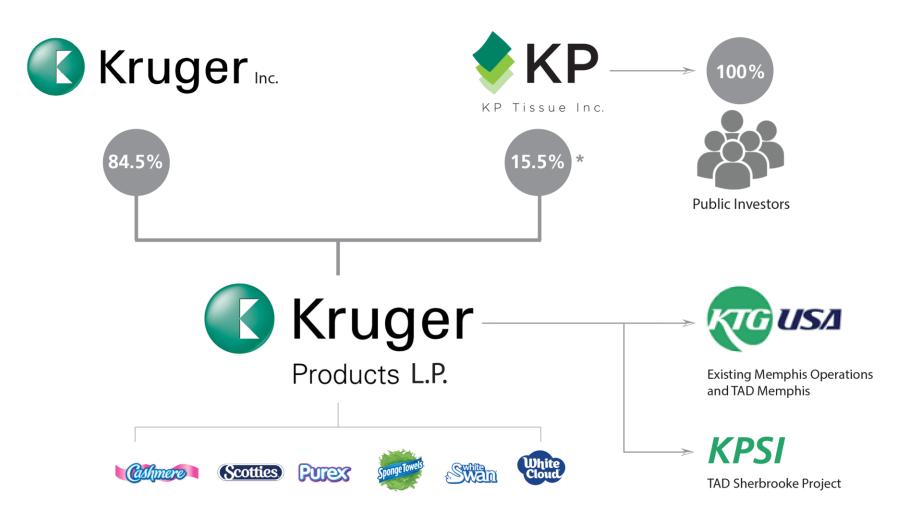

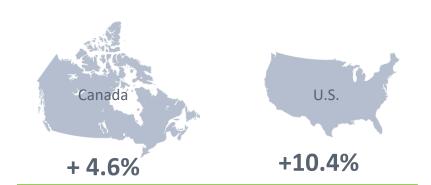

Revenue

The increase in revenue was primarily due to the favourable impact of the Consumer Canada price increase implemented in Q4 2018 and higher sales volume

- Primarily due to significantly higher fibre costs, increased warehousing costs, outsourced manufacturing combined with unfavourable sales mix and foreign exchange
- Partially offset by the Q4 2018 Canada Consumer selling price increase, higher sales volume and lower SG&A

\$4.8 M over 2018

Net loss of \$3.2 million compared to net income of \$1.6 million a year ago, a decrease of \$4.8 million.

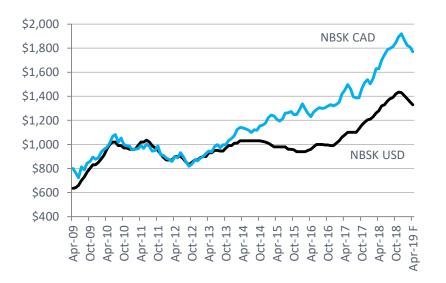
Pulp Input Prices



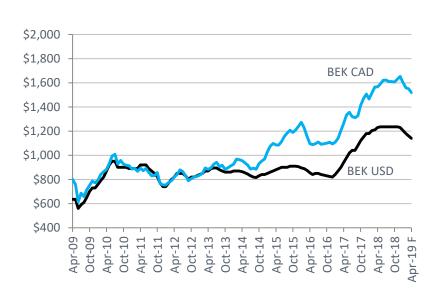
Q1 2019 market pulp prices rose year-over-year in CAD, but decreased sequentially (NBSK -3.0% and BEK -4.0% in CAD) compared to Q4 2018.

Pulp prices in USD have moderated in Q1 2019 and based on industry forecasts, are expected to remain in a similar range in 2019. The volatile CAD will create further fluctuations in pulp input costs.

BEK List Prices per MT (Q1 2019 +4% YOY in CAD)

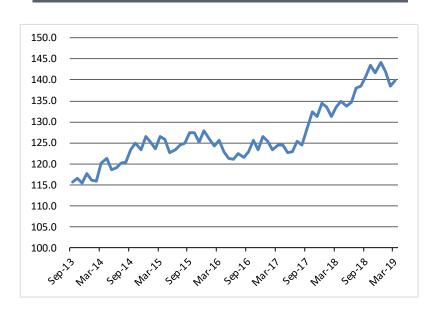






Freight costs have risen significantly since the beginning of 2017 and reached an all-time high in Q4 2018. Management expects these costs to remain high in 2019, however they softened somewhat in Q1 2019.

Cass Truckload Linehaul Index™ (Q1 2019 +4.8% YOY)

The Cass Truckload Linehaul Index[™] is an accurate, timely indicator of market fluctuations in per-mile truckload pricing. The index isolates the linehaul component of full truckload costs from other components (e.g. fuel and accessorials), providing an accurate reflection of trends in baseline truckload prices.

Data within this unique index is derived from actual freight invoices paid on behalf of Cass' clients. The index uses January 2005 as its base month.

Price Increases



Consumer business

- New price increase announced in Canada consumer business in July 2018 took effect in Q4 2018, with full market impact in Q1 2019
- US consumer price increase announced in late Q4 will benefit 2019 and gain traction starting in Q2

AFH business

 An additional price increase announced in AFH business, in Canada and in the US, effective May 1st, 2019. Considering contractual agreements with customers, the benefits will materialize over several quarters

Network Savings 2019 – Continued new initiatives to improve margins



Operational excellence initiative

- Currently implementing an Operational Excellence project with a 3rd party consultant
- Started in February 2019 with initial focus on two lead facilities. Also advancing AFH facilities timeline considering performance
- Starting to implement lean manufacturing practices. Improving lead indicators such as reduced unplanned downtime and waste, and increasing asset speed. Financial results will continue to build over time
- Also implementing a logistics project with another partner to drive down freight and warehousing costs
- Combined savings target of \$15 to \$20 million on a run-rate basis, by the end of 2020

TAD Sherbrooke Project Update



- On time and on budget, progressing against our execution plan
- Governance structure in place
- Excavation started this spring
- Purchased or contracted for most of the assets required for the Project
- Starting selling process:
 - Strong interest from existing and new North American customers

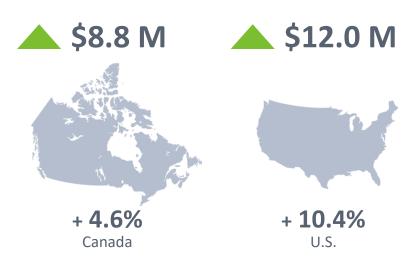

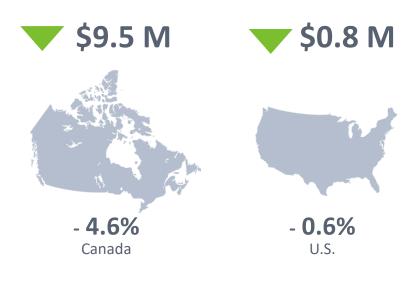
Q1 revenue Decrease

- Consumer segment was down \$4.7 million or 1.6%
- AFH segment revenue decreased by \$3.8 million or 6.5%
- Q1 typically has seasonally lower sales volume than Q4

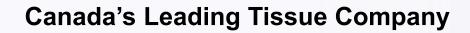
CAPEX



CAPEX, excluding TAD Sherbrooke Project



- Q1 2019 CAPEX totalled \$18.5 million, including \$11.8 million related to the TAD Sherbrooke Project
- 2019 CAPEX, excluding TAD Sherbrooke, estimated at between \$30 and \$35 million
- 2019 TAD Sherbrooke CAPEX estimated at between \$250 and \$275 million

AFH Segment



Resetting the AFH business to create a more efficient manufacturing and logistics footprint:

- Weak results were impacted by high pulp and freight costs, a competitive environment and outsourcing costs
- Paper capacity constraints requires purchase of paper in open markets at higher costs. Variability of paper quality purchased has caused production and logistics inefficiencies. New paper suppliers should improve quality situation going forward
- New price increase announced recently in Canada and the US effective May 1st, 2019. However, market remains very price competitive
- Operational excellence project will benefit AFH facilities
- Continued market and outsourcing costs will impact AFH in 2019 with improvements expected in second half of 2019

TAD Sherbrooke Project

- Site location in Sherbrooke, Quebec in the Brompton area
- Total cost of C\$575 million
- Anticipate output of approximately 70,000 metric tonnes per annum
- Designed to allow paper towels to be manufactured at very high speeds
- Financial return of project driven by:
 - new volume
 - capitalizing on the expanded towel manufacturing capability
 - creating manufacturing efficiencies with
 TAD1 machine for the US market
- Ability to leverage the advantages created from the TAD1 project in Memphis
- Project will take 27 months from permitting through construction to start-up, which is expected in early 2021

TAD Sherbrooke Project Financing Overview¹

- Financing structure is non-dilutive to KPT shareholders
- Newly-created, wholly-owned subsidiary of KPLP, Kruger Products Sherbrooke Inc. (KPSI)
- Financed by 60% debt (\$345 million) and 40% equity (\$230 million)
- 40% equity component is comprised of:
 - \$125 million from KPLP
 - ~\$63 million of long-term senior secured fixed debt
 - ~\$62 million from accounts receivable factoring and cash
 - \$105 million from convertible debenture with Investissement Québec with a capitalized fixed interest rate of 3% on a 10-year term
- Weighted average cost of capital for TAD Sherbrooke financing is expected to be in the 5-7% range
- Existing KTG has been refinanced with an 18 year term loan concurrently with the TAD Sherbrooke financing, with 7.3% maximum fixed interest rate
