






PULP INPUT PRICES

Q2 2023 NBSK average prices¹ in CAD decreased 10.4% and BEK average prices¹ decreased 17.0% from Q1 2023.

Q2 2023 NBSK average prices¹ in CAD decreased 8.9% and BEK average prices¹ decreased 11.4% year-over-year. Based on industry commentary for 2023, pulp prices are at or near the bottom of the price curve.





(CAD/USD averaged 1.34 in Q2 2023, up 5% from Q2 2022)







SHERBROOKE OPERATIONS AND EXPANSION

- TAD operations continue to perform well, surpassing production expectations on the paper machine and in converting
- Implementation of facial line (Q4 2023) and paper machine (Q4 2024) tracking to plan, but closely watching supply chain and inflation
- New converting line start-up was the fastest of all Sherbrooke converting lines due to OPEX learnings and AI
- Hiring process proceeding to plan for new facial and paper machine assets





MEMPHIS OPERATIONS

- Strengthened focus on TAD operations, both converting and paper machine
- Deploying digital twin AI tools to accelerate start-up curve of new facial tissue line
- New facial line continues to exceed ramp-up curve
- Sales volume and cost structure progressively improving
- Employee turnover has stabilized






FOCUSED BRAND SUPPORT

Geographic revenue segmentation





Q2 2023 ADJUSTED EBITDA¹ COMPARED TO Q2 2022



\$55.0M in Q2 2023 compared to \$11.8M in Q2 2022

Increase primarily due to the following factors:

- Higher selling prices versus Q2 2022
- Favourable sales mix and higher sales volume
- Memphis plant operations improvement
- Lower freight rates

Partially offset by:

- Inflation on manufacturing costs
- Higher warehousing and SG&A expenses
- Unfavourable FX impact

\$55.0M in Q2 2023 compared to \$50.0M in Q1 2023

Variance due to:

- Higher sales volume
- Lower freight costs

Partially offset by:

- Increased warehousing costs
- Higher plant overhead costs and absorption from inventory reduction
- Higher SG&A expenses, particularly marketing spending



- Cash increased \$42.9 million from Q1 2023
- Net debt decreased \$61.6 million on a sequential basis
- Leverage improved to 5.7x due to lower net debt and higher LTM Adjusted EBITDA



CAPITAL EXPENDITURES



- Q2 2023 CAPEX was \$42.8 million, including \$36.9 million related to Sherbrooke Expansion Project
- Year-to-date CAPEX stood at \$77.4 million
- Projected 2023 CAPEX of \$200-\$230 million, including Sherbrooke Expansion Project
