The following Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) dated November 8, 2023 for KP Tissue Inc. (KPT) and Kruger Products Inc. (Kruger Products) is intended to assist the readers in understanding the business environment, strategies, performance and risk factors relating to KPT and Kruger Products. It should be read in conjunction with the unaudited condensed financial statements of KPT for the 3-month periods ended September 30, 2023 and September 30, 2022, respectively, and the 9-month periods ended September 30, 2023 and September 30, 2022, respectively, and the 9-month periods ended September 30, 2023 and September 30, 2023 (Q3 2023) and September 30, 2022 (Q3 2022) respectively, and the 9-month periods ended September 30, 2023 (YTD 2023) and September 30, 2022 (YTD 2022), respectively.

About KP Tissue Inc.

KPT was created to acquire, and its business is limited to holding, an equity interest in Kruger Products, which is accounted for as an investment in an associate using the equity method of accounting. As of September 30, 2023, KPT held a 13.3% interest in Kruger Products. The following MD&A provides discussion and analysis related to KPT to the extent necessary to understand the equity method of accounting. However, the majority of the discussion and analysis relates to Kruger Products and to KPT's investment in Kruger Products.

On January 1, 2023, Kruger Products L.P. (KPLP) undertook a corporate reorganization (the Reorganization) pursuant to which KPLP sold and assigned to its wholly-owned subsidiary, Kruger Products, and Kruger Products purchased and assumed from KPLP, in exchange for common shares, all of the properties, operations, assets and liabilities of KPLP, and KPLP was subsequently dissolved and wound-up into its partners. As a result of the Reorganization, Kruger Products, as the successor corporate entity to KPLP, now operates the business previously operated by KPLP. Unless the context otherwise requires, references herein to "KPLP" are references to Kruger Products Inc. for the period following the Reorganization. Refer to Business Highlights, Corporate Reorganization for additional details.

OVERVIEW

Business Overview

Kruger Products is Canada's leading tissue products supplier by overall dollar and volume market share. It produces, distributes, markets and sells a wide range of disposable tissue products, including bathroom tissue, facial tissue, paper towels and napkins, for both the Consumer and the Away-From-Home (AFH) markets (in each case, as defined below). While its principal focus is on the Canadian consumer-branded tissue products market, Kruger Products is also a leader in the Canadian AFH market and has a considerable presence in the U.S. private label tissue market. The Consumer segment consists of well recognized brands such as *Cashmere, Purex, Scotties, SpongeTowels* and *Bonterra* in Canada and *White Cloud* in the United States.

Kruger Products is headquartered in Mississauga, Ontario and has approximately 2,800 employees across Canada and the United States. Kruger Products' Canadian paper manufacturing facilities, consisting of four tissue plants in Québec and one plant in British Columbia, have a combined annual tissue production capacity of approximately 350,000 metric tonnes which, according to RISI data, represents approximately 44% of Canada's annual production capacity. In the U.S., Kruger Products operates a manufacturing facility in Memphis, Tennessee held in its wholly owned subsidiary K.T.G. (USA) Inc. (KTG), which currently has an aggregate production capacity of 85,000 metric tonnes.

Pursuant to its Articles, KPT's business is limited to (i) the investment in, holding of and disposition of limited partnership interests, units, shares or other securities of Kruger Products, (ii) the acquisition of, holding, operation and disposition of any assets, liabilities, operations or business of such entities, and (iii) all activities related, incidental or ancillary to any of the foregoing.

As of the date of the MD&A and following the Reorganization and participation by Kruger Products' shareholders in the Kruger Products DRIP on October 16, 2023, KPT held 13.1% of the Kruger Products class B common shares (the Kruger Products Common Shares). Refer to Business Highlights, Corporate Reorganization for additional details.

Basis of Presentation

The unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements of Kruger Products presented for Q3 2023 and YTD 2023 and Q3 2022 and YTD 2022 and the unaudited condensed financial statements of KPT presented for the 3-month and 9-month periods ended September 30, 2023 and September 30, 2022, respectively, have each been prepared in accordance with IFRS (International Financial Reporting Standards) for interim financial statements, including IAS 34, Interim Financial Reporting.

Accounting Periods

This MD&A includes financial information for the 3-month and 9-month periods ended September 30, 2023 and September 30, 2022, respectively.

Non-GAAP Financial Measures

This MD&A refers to "Adjusted EBITDA", a measure which does not have a standardized meaning prescribed by GAAP and therefore may not be comparable to similarly titled measures presented by other companies. Kruger Products believes that this measure provides useful information to management of Kruger Products and the readers of the financial information in measuring the financial performance and financial condition of Kruger Products.

"Adjusted EBITDA" is calculated by Kruger Products as net income (loss) before (i) interest expense and other finance costs, (ii) income taxes, (iii) depreciation, (iv) amortization, (v) impairment (gain on sale) of non-financial assets, (vi) loss (gain) on disposal of property, plant and equipment, (vii) foreign exchange loss (gain), (viii) costs related to restructuring activities, (ix) changes in amortized cost of Partnership units liability, (x) change in fair value of derivatives, (xi) consulting costs related to operational transformation initiatives, (xii) corporate development related costs and (xiii) loss (gain) on sale of shares. We use "Adjusted EBITDA" to evaluate the performance of our business as it reflects its ongoing profitability. This MD&A contains a reconciliation of Adjusted EBITDA to net income (loss), the most comparable GAAP measure, on page 5.

Outlook

Kruger Products is committed to building its consumer brands and developing innovative products for its retail and commercial customers. Kruger Products' strategy is to maintain its leadership position in the Canadian market. Though the Canadian tissue market is expected to remain competitive, Kruger Products believes that its brands and products are well positioned for continued growth. Kruger Products will aim to sustain its consumer and AFH leadership position in the Canadian tissue industry by driving marketing and sales excellence, extending product lines, continuing to leverage product development and manufacturing technology to drive product superiority and cost savings, and emphasizing manufacturing quality and efficiency.

Kruger Products also expects to continue to grow by leveraging its Through Air Dry (TAD) product capabilities in Canada and the United States and focusing on the high-end private label business in the U.S. market. Kruger Products' U.S. strategy also includes the expansion of the White Cloud brand to additional U.S. retailers.

BUSINESS HIGHLIGHTS

Sherbrooke Expansion Project

In 2021, Kruger Products announced an investment totaling \$351.5 million to expand the Sherbrooke operations with a Light Dry Crepe (LDC) tissue machine and two new production lines as well as the construction of a new tissue manufacturing facility (the Sherbrooke Expansion Project) over the following three years. The first stage of this project, a new bathroom tissue converting line, successfully started-up in February 2023. The second stage, the construction of a new tissue manufacturing facility, is well underway and includes a new facial tissue converting line expected to start-up in Q1

2024. The final stage of the project is the LDC paper machine, expected to start-up in Q4 2024 and at maturity increase Kruger Products' annual output by at least 60,000 metric tonnes. As a result of significant inflation across the supply chain and also interest rate increases during construction, the cost of the project is now forecast to increase to \$377.5 million, excluding start-up expenses and working capital. The additional costs are being financed by investments from Kruger Products into KPSB (of which \$8.2 million was made on October 3, 2023) and an \$8.2 million increase in the KPSB Construction Facility (refer to Liquidity and Capital Resources, Indebtedness, KPSB Senior Credit Agreement for additional details). Management continues to monitor the project closely to minimize the impact of any further inflation.

The additional capacity will allow Kruger Products to expand its product offering and is expected to enable it to grow its market share across its different categories, including bathroom tissue, paper towels and facial tissue for household and away-from-home use under such brands as Cashmere[®], SpongeTowels[®], Scotties[®], Purex[®] and Bonterra[™] in Canada, and White Cloud[®] in the U.S.

Corporate Reorganization

On January 1, 2023, KPLP undertook a corporate reorganization (the Reorganization) pursuant to which KPLP, a limited partnership, was essentially replaced by a corporate entity without adversely affecting KPT. More specifically, KPLP sold and assigned to its wholly-owned subsidiary, Kruger Products, and Kruger Products purchased and assumed from KPLP, in exchange for common shares, all of the properties, operations, assets and liabilities of KPLP, and KPLP was subsequently dissolved and wound-up into its partners. As a result of the Reorganization, Kruger Products, as the successor corporate entity to KPLP, now operates the business previously operated by KPLP.

The interest that KPT previously held in KPLP is now held in Kruger Products, and, through a shareholders' agreement dated January 1, 2023 entered into with Kruger Inc. (the Shareholders' Agreement), KPT has substantially equivalent rights in respect of the operation of, and its investment in, Kruger Products, as it had in respect of KPLP. The Reorganization was undertaken to realize certain tax efficiencies for Kruger Products and to simplify Kruger Products' corporate structure and financial reporting. The Reorganization was approved by the independent directors of KPT.

The Shareholders' Agreement, and certain other agreements with Kruger Inc. that were amended and restated to reflect the Reorganization, are described in the Annual Information Form, and copies of those agreements are available on SEDAR at <u>www.sedar.com</u>.

Pursuant to the Shareholders' Agreement, the board of directors of Kruger Products shall determine the amount and date of any distribution by way of dividend. The holders of the issued and outstanding Kruger Products Common Shares are entitled to receive dividends if, as and when declared by the board of directors of Kruger Products.

Pursuant to the Shareholders' Agreement, Kruger Products adopted a dividend reinvestment plan (the Kruger Products DRIP), which permits shareholders that elect to participate in the Kruger Products DRIP to automatically reinvest all cash dividends in additional common shares at a price per common share equal to 100% of the five-day weighted average trading price of the common shares prior to the date of payment of the dividend.

Shutdown of Certain Memphis Plant Production Assets

On November 14, 2022, Kruger Products announced that certain older and inefficient production assets would be shut down at its plant in Memphis, Tennessee in January 2023. The plant, operated by Kruger Products' subsidiary KTG, announced the shutdown of production assets including a LDC paper machine and six converting lines. The shutdown of these assets was determined to be in the best interests of operating efficiencies and profitability of the Memphis plant, and high quality facial tissue and premium TAD products will continue to be produced at the plant. Total restructuring costs were \$3.7 million, of which \$2.6 million was recorded in the consolidated statement of comprehensive income in fiscal 2022, with the remaining \$1.1 million recorded in Q1 2023. Following the shutdown, the Memphis manufacturing facility consists of one TAD paper machine (the Memphis TAD Machine) with an aggregate annual capacity of 55,000 metric tonnes and one adjacent LDC paper machine with an aggregate annual capacity of 30,000 metric tonnes.

Results of Operations Q3 2023 compared to Q3 2022

Revenue

Revenue was \$473.4 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$427.0 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$46.4 million or 10.9%. The increase in revenue was primarily due to higher sales volume and favourable sales mix in the Consumer segment, along with the favourable impact of selling price increases implemented across all segments and regions during 2022. Revenue was also favourably impacted by foreign exchange fluctuations on U.S. dollar sales (USD average 1.34 in Q3 2023 compared to 1.30 in Q3 2022). From a geographic perspective, revenue in Canada increased \$17.8 million or 7.1%, while revenue in the U.S. increased \$28.6 million, or 16.1%.

Cost of Sales

Cost of sales was \$386.3 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$394.6 million in Q3 2022, a decrease of \$8.3 million or 2.1%. Manufacturing costs decreased as lower pulp and other input costs, along with productivity improvements in plant operations, were only partially offset by higher sales volumes and the unfavourable impact of foreign exchange fluctuations on U.S. dollar costs. Freight costs were lower compared to Q3 2022 as supply constraints and inflation moderated, while warehousing costs increased as a result of additional logistics network costs. As a percentage of revenue, cost of sales was 81.6% in Q3 2023 compared to 92.4% in Q3 2022.

Selling, General and Administrative Expenses

Selling, general and administrative (SG&A) expenses were \$40.0 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$30.1 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$9.9 million or 33.0%. The increase was primarily due to higher advertising spend in the quarter, higher personnel costs, higher consulting costs, lower foreign exchange gains compared to the year ago quarter and higher related party management fees. As a percentage of revenue, SG&A expenses were 8.4% in Q3 2023 compared to 7.0% in Q3 2022.

Adjusted EBITDA

Adjusted EBITDA¹ was \$72.4 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$30.7 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$41.7 million or 135.7%. The significant increase was primarily due to a combination of factors: higher sales volumes and favourable sales mix, selling price increases in 2022, lower pulp and other input costs, productivity improvements in plant operations and lower freight costs. These factors were partially offset by higher warehousing and SG&A expenses and the unfavourable impact of foreign exchange fluctuations.

Interest Expense and Other Finance Costs

Interest expense and other finance costs were \$16.7 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$18.9 million in Q3 2022, a decrease of \$2.2 million. The decrease was primarily due to higher interest income and lower pension interest expense, partially offset by higher interest rates on variable rate operating debt.

Foreign Exchange Loss

Foreign exchange loss was \$8.4 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$26.0 million in Q3 2022 due to the favourable impact of foreign exchange fluctuations on USD denominated debt.

Income Taxes

An income tax expense of \$7.1 million was recorded in Q3 2023 compared to an income tax recovery of \$3.9 million in Q3 2022. Kruger Products Inc. is now directly taxable on its Canadian business as a result of the Reorganization on January 1, 2023, while it was operating as a limited partnership during Q3 2022 and not directly taxable on its Canadian business. Income tax in partner's hands was an expense of \$1.1 million in Q3 2022.

Net Income (Loss) attributable to Kruger Products

Net income was \$12.9 million in Q3 2023 compared to a loss of \$38.8 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$51.7 million. The increase was primarily due to higher Adjusted EBITDA¹ of \$41.7 million, lower foreign exchange loss of \$17.6 million, lower interest expense and other financing costs of \$2.2 million, and lower consulting costs of \$3.5 million, partially offset by higher income tax expense of \$11.0 million, and a loss from non-controlling interest of \$1.9 million resulting from the parent company, Kruger Inc., continuing with the monthly redemption payments under the KPSI IQ Debenture in Q3 2023.

Results of Operations YTD 2023 compared to YTD 2022

Revenue

Revenue was \$1,390.7 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$1,223.3 million in YTD 2022, an increase of \$167.4 million or 13.7%. The increase in revenue was primarily due to higher sales volumes and favourable sales mix, along with the favourable impact of selling price increases implemented across all segments and regions during 2022. Revenue was also favourably impacted by foreign exchange fluctuations on U.S. dollar sales (USD average 1.35 in YTD 2023 compared to 1.28 in YTD 2022). From a geographic perspective, revenue in Canada increased \$61.5 million or 8.4%, while revenue in the U.S. increased \$105.9 million, or 21.6%.

Cost of Sales

Cost of sales was \$1,171.1 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$1,131.0 million in YTD 2022, an increase of \$40.1 million or 3.6%. While the significant inflation experienced during 2022 has moderated during 2023, manufacturing input costs, including pulp, were higher than the first three quarters of 2022. Unfavourable foreign exchange fluctuations on U.S. dollar costs also impacted manufacturing costs while improvements in Memphis operations benefitted manufacturing costs. Freight costs were lower compared to YTD 2022 as supply constraints and inflation moderated, while warehousing costs increased as a result of additional logistics network costs. As a percentage of revenue, cost of sales was 84.2% in YTD 2023 compared to 92.5% in YTD 2022.

Selling, General and Administrative Expenses

Selling, general and administrative (SG&A) expenses were \$116.9 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$94.0 million in YTD 2022, an increase of \$22.9 million or 24.3%. The increase was primarily due to higher personnel costs, foreign exchange losses related to foreign denominated working capital and higher consulting costs, related party management fees and selling expenses along with a loss on disposal of fixed assets. As a percentage of revenue, SG&A expenses were 8.4% in YTD 2023 compared to 7.7% in YTD 2022.

Adjusted EBITDA

Adjusted EBITDA¹ was \$177.4 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$71.6 million in YTD 2022, an increase of \$105.8 million or 147.8%. The significant increase was primarily due to a combination of factors: selling price increases in 2022 along with higher sales volumes and favourable sales mix, improvements in Memphis operations and lower freight costs, which were partially offset by higher pulp prices and other input cost inflation compared to YTD 2022, higher warehousing and SG&A expenses and the unfavourable impact of foreign exchange fluctuations.

Interest Expense and Other Finance Costs

Interest expense and other finance costs were \$51.7 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$53.8 million in YTD 2022, a decrease of \$2.1 million. The decrease was primarily due to higher interest income, the loss on extinguishment of debt recorded under IFRS related to the refinancing of the CAD\$107 million term loan in KPSI that did not repeat in YTD 2023 and lower pension interest expense, partially offset by higher debt levels compared to Q3 2022 and higher interest rates on variable rate operating debt.

Foreign Exchange Loss (Gain)

Foreign exchange gain was \$0.8 million in YTD 2023 compared to a loss of \$34.4 million in YTD 2022 due to the favourable impact of foreign exchange fluctuations on USD denominated debt.

Income Taxes

An income tax expense of \$70.8 million was recorded in YTD 2023 compared to an income tax recovery of \$18.0 million in YTD 2022. Kruger Products Inc. is now directly taxable on its Canadian business as a result of the Reorganization on January 1, 2023 while it was operating as a limited partnership during YTD 2022 and not directly taxable on its Canadian business. The income tax expense in YTD 2023 was primarily due to a deferred tax expense of \$68.9 million, which related primarily to the recognition of the deferred tax liability resulting from all temporary differences between the tax value and carrying value of Kruger Product's assets and liabilities transferred in the Reorganization on January 1st. Income tax in partner's hands was an expense of \$4.8 million in YTD 2022.

Net Loss attributable to Kruger Products

Net loss was \$21.8 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$72.9 million in YTD 2022, a decrease in the loss of \$51.1 million. The decrease in the loss was primarily due to higher Adjusted EBITDA¹ of \$105.8, lower foreign exchange loss of \$35.2, and lower consulting costs of \$3.5 million, partially offset by higher income tax expense of \$88.8 million, higher depreciation and amortization expense of \$3.8 million, a loss on sale of fixed assets of \$1.1 million and a loss from non-controlling interest of \$1.5 million resulting from the parent company, Kruger Inc., assuming the monthly redemption payments under the KPSI IQ Debenture in YTD 2023.

"Consumer Segment Adjusted EBITDA1" and "AFH Segment Adjusted EBITDA1" means in each case the Segment operating income for the referring respective segment of Kruger Products.

Consumer Segment

Q3 2023 compared to Q3 2022

Consumer segment revenue was \$390.3 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$346.0 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$44.3 million or 12.8%. The increase in revenue was due to higher sales volumes along with favourable sales mix, selling price increases implemented in Canada and the U.S. during 2022 and the favourable impact of foreign exchange fluctuations on U.S. dollar sales. Consumer segment revenue increased in both Canada and the U.S.

Consumer Segment Adjusted EBITDA¹ was \$65.9 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$25.0 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$40.9 million. The significant increase in Adjusted EBITDA¹ was primarily due to the increase in Consumer segment revenue, lower manufacturing costs and lower freight costs, partially offset by higher warehousing and SG&A expenses.

YTD 2023 compared to YTD 2022

Consumer segment revenue was \$1,150.3 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$1015.3 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$135.0 million or 13.3%. The increase in revenue was due to higher sales volume along with favourable sales mix, selling price increases implemented in Canada and the U.S. during 2022 and the favourable impact of foreign exchange fluctuations on U.S. dollar sales. Consumer segment revenue increased in both Canada and the U.S.

Consumer Segment Adjusted EBITDA¹ was \$170.5 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$74.7 million in YTD 2022, an increase of \$95.8 million. The significant increase in Adjusted EBITDA¹ was primarily due to the increase in Consumer segment revenue along with lower freight costs, partially offset by higher cost of sales and higher SG&A expenses.

AFH Segment

Q3 2023 compared to Q3 2022

AFH segment revenue was \$83.1 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$81.0 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$2.1 million or 2.6%. The increase was primarily due to selling price increases implemented during 2022 and the favourable impact of foreign exchange fluctuations on U.S. dollar sales, partially offset by slightly lower sales volume. AFH segment revenue increased in the U.S. and decreased in Canada.

AFH Segment Adjusted EBITDA¹ was \$8.4 million in Q3 2023 compared to \$5.4 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$3.0 million. The increase was primarily due to the favourable revenue impact, lower manufacturing costs and lower freight costs, partially offset by higher warehousing and SG&A expenses.

YTD 2023 compared to YTD 2022

AFH segment revenue was \$240.4 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$208.0 million in YTD 2022, an increase of \$32.4 million or 15.6%. The increase was primarily due to higher sales volumes in both the U.S. and Canada, selling price increases implemented during 2022 and the favourable impact of foreign exchange fluctuations on U.S. dollar sales. AFH segment revenue increased in both the U.S. and Canada.

AFH Segment Adjusted EBITDA¹ was \$15.1 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$1.7 million in YTD 2022, an increase of \$13.4 million. The increase was primarily due to the favourable revenue impact and lower freight costs, partially offset by higher cost of sales, higher warehousing and SG&A costs.

Corporate and Other Costs

Corporate and other costs include certain management overhead costs not directly attributable to the business segments.

Q3 2023 compared to Q3 2022

Corporate and other costs were \$1.9 million in Q3 2023 compared to income of \$0.3 million in Q3 2022, an increase of \$2.2 million resulting primarily from lower foreign exchange gains related to working capital in compared to the year ago quarter and higher related party management fees.

YTD 2023 compared to YTD 2022

Corporate and other costs were \$8.2 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$4.8 million in YTD 2022, an increase of \$3.4 million resulting primarily from higher foreign exchange losses related to working capital in YTD 2023 and higher related party management fees.

LIQUIDITY AND CAPITAL RESOURCES

Overview

Kruger Products' principal uses of funds are for operating costs, working capital, capital expenditures, pension contributions and dividends (together, the Funding Requirements). To date, Kruger Products has met the Funding Requirements by using cash generated from operating activities and the Dividend Reinvestment Plan and borrowings under its various debt facilities. Kruger Products is required to make funding contributions to the sponsored, registered defined benefit pension plans (RDBPP) over the next ten years. Kruger Products Management believes that cash generated from

operations and the Dividend Reinvestment Plan, together with amounts available under the various debt facilities will be sufficient to meet its future Funding Requirements. However, Kruger Products' ability to meet future Funding Requirements and its ability to make scheduled payments of interest and principal on its debt facilities and to satisfy any of its other present or future debt obligations will depend on its future operating performance, which will be affected by general economic, financial, and other factors including factors beyond its control. Kruger Products Management reviews investment opportunities in the normal course of its business and may, if suitable opportunities arise, make selected investments to implement Kruger Products' business strategy. Historically, the funding for any such investments has come from cash flows from operations and/or additional debt.

As of September 30, 2023, Kruger Products was in compliance with all of its financial covenants under all of its outstanding credit facilities. As of September 30, 2023, Kruger Products had drawn \$50 million from the \$200 million committed amount under the Kruger Products Senior Credit Facility and had \$15.1 million of letters of credit outstanding, resulting in \$134.9 million available from the Kruger Products Senior Credit Facility, subject to covenant limitations. As of September 30, 2023, Kruger Products had two revolving loans available under the TAD Sherbrooke Project Facility. The US\$10 million (\$13.5 million) revolving loan had draws of US\$3.0 million (\$4.0 million) and the \$12.5 million revolving loans. As of September 30, 2023, KPSB had drawn \$1.5 million from the \$5 million committed amount under the KPSB Revolving Facility and had \$3.1 million of letters of credit outstanding, resulting in \$0.4 million available from the KPSB Revolving Facility, subject to covenant limitations. As of September 31, 2022 - \$133.4 million) representing cash and cash equivalents and availability under the KPSB Revolving Facility within the covenant limitations. In addition, \$22.5 million (December 31, 2022 - \$29.7 million) of cash and cash equivalents were held by Kruger Products for the Sherbrooke Expansion project.

As it pertains to capital expenditures, approximately \$25 million annually relates to maintenance projects and the remaining expenditures are focused on strategic and growth projects aimed at reducing costs and offsetting annual inflation or increasing production capacity. Regular growth projects focused on performance improvement generally have a 3 to 4 year payback. Capital expenditures were \$105.9 million in YTD 2023, including \$90.3 million related to the Sherbrooke Expansion Project (including interest capitalized during construction) and government assistance received of \$1.3 million. Capital expenditures are expected to be approximately \$190 million to \$210 million in fiscal 2023, including the Sherbrooke Expansion Project.

The tissue industry is generally characterized by high sales volume and rapid turnover of inventories and accounts receivable. In general, accounts receivable and inventories are readily convertible into cash. Investment in working capital may be affected by fluctuations in the prices of pulp and other supply costs, vendor terms and timing of collection of accounts receivable. Kruger Products participates in a factoring program to assist in managing working capital. Under the program, Kruger Products derecognizes certain receivables upon sale.

Net Cash Flows from (used in) Operating Activities

Net cash from operating activities was \$236.1 million in YTD 2023 compared to net cash used in operating activities of \$24.3 million in YTD 2022. Cash from operating activities in YTD 2023 was primarily driven by Adjusted EBITDA¹ of \$177.4 million (YTD 2022 - \$71.6 million), a decrease in working capital of \$64.3 million (YTD 2022 – an increase of \$85.2 million), partially offset by provisions paid of \$3.4 million (YTD 2022 - \$4.0 million), income tax payments of \$2.0 million (YTD 2022 - \$1.8 million) and pension and post-retirement benefit contributions above expense of \$1.0 million (YTD 2022 - \$1.6 million).

Net Cash Flows used in Investing Activities

Net cash used in investing activities was \$103.4 million in YTD 2023 compared to \$76.6 million in YTD 2022. Cash used in investing activities related to capital expenditures of \$105.9 million (including \$90.3 million for the Sherbrooke Expansion Project) in YTD 2023 compared to \$76.6 million (including \$30,2 million for the Sherbrooke Expansion Project and \$15.2 million for the TAD Sherbrooke Project) in YTD 2022. This was partially offset by proceeds on sale of property, plant and equipment of \$2.5 million in YTD 2023.

Net Cash Flows from (used in) Financing Activities

Net cash used in financing activities was \$52.8 million in YTD 2023 compared to net cash from financing activities of \$33.1 million in YTD 2022. Net cash used in financing activities in YTD 2023 was primarily due to interest paid of \$34.3 million (YTD 2022 - \$36.2 million), lease payments of \$20.8 million (YTD 2022 - \$21.3 million), payment to related party of \$5.7 million (YTD 2022 - nil), net dividends paid of \$5.2 million (YTD 2022 net distributions - \$15.8 million), the change in Restricted cash of \$3.9 million (YTD 2022 - \$3.5 million), deferred financing fees paid of \$0.4 million (YTD 2022 - \$2.8 million), partially offset by proceeds from debt net of repayments of \$17.6 million (YTD 2022 - \$112.6 million).

Contractual Obligations

Kruger Products' contractual obligations consist of long-term debt (principal repayments and interest payments), rightof-use leases for the rental of property, equipment and motor vehicles and pensions.

As of September 30, 2023, Kruger Products had \$89.9 million (December 31, 2022 – \$121.7 million) of commitments related to the Sherbrooke Expansion Project.

Kruger Products' cash pension contribution for defined benefit pension arrangements in YTD 2023 was \$5.7 million, while its post-retirement benefits contribution was \$1.7 million. In addition, as of September 30, 2023, Kruger Products had \$13.1 million of letters of credit related to pensions outstanding. Pension contributions for fiscal 2023 are expected to be \$10.4 million and post-retirement contributions for fiscal 2023 are expected to be \$2.4 million.

As a result of the Reorganization, the Partnership unit liability was extinguished as the Limited Partnership Agreement was dissolved and the corresponding requirement to make the Tax Distribution was eliminated. The outstanding liability of \$133.6 million as of January 1, 2023 was reclassified to Equity in the unaudited condensed consolidated statements of financial position. Refer to Business Highlights, Corporate Reorganization for additional details.

The Exchange Agreement was amended and restated on January 1, 2023 to reflect the Reorganization. shares, acquisition of assets by KPT other than Kruger Products common shares or incurrence of liabilities other than ordinary course liabilities, or special distributions by KPT, certain other securities, debt or assets to all shareholders. If at any time the Kruger Inc. aggregate ownership interest is less than 20% in Kruger Products, KPT may require the exchange of all outstanding Kruger Products common shares held by Kruger Inc. or its affiliates in return for KPT Common Shares on the basis of one Kruger Products common share for one KPT Common Share subject to adjustment as set forth above. As of September 30, 2023, no Kruger Products common shares had been exchanged for KPT Common Shares.

The Administration Agreement was amended and restated on January 1, 2023 to reflect the Reorganization. Pursuant to the Administration Agreement, Kruger Products, as administrator (the Administrator) has full power and authority to administer, subject to the general supervision and any specific instructions of the KPT Board, all of the ongoing operations and affairs of KPT in order for KPT to carry on its activities as a public company. The Administrator shall directly bear and pay for all KPT's normal operating expenses incurred in connection with the ordinary course operation of a company that is a reporting issuer. The Administrator may also advance funds to KPT in an amount equal to pay for any expenses of KPT that are outside of such ordinary course expenses, by way of non-recourse, interest-free loans, repayable upon payment by the Administrator of distributions to KPT. As KPT's agent, the Administrator will also bear and pay all outlays and expenses to third parties incurred by the Administrator in the administration of the affairs of KPT and the performance by the Administrator of its duties under the Administration Agreement.

Indebtedness

KPSI IQ Debenture

Pursuant to the KPSI Repayment Agreement, Kruger Products waived its priority right to make the nine monthly redemption payments in 2023 under the KPSI IQ Debenture and Kruger Inc. notified Investissement Québec that it would instead make the monthly redemption payments. Kruger Inc. received common shares of Kruger Products Sherbrooke Inc. (KPSI) with a value of \$14.6 million as consideration, resulting in Kruger Inc. holding a 9.2% non-controlling interest directly in KPSI as of September 30, 2023. As a result, a non-controlling interest of \$16.2 million has been recorded in the unaudited condensed consolidated statement of financial position as of September 30, 2023. Net loss and comprehensive loss in the unaudited condensed consolidated statements of income (loss) and comprehensive income (loss) for YTD 2023 include a loss of \$1.6 million directly attributable to Kruger Inc's share of loss in KPSI. Two monthly redemption payments by Kruger Inc. occurred subsequent to September 30, 2023.

KPSB Senior Credit Agreement

Subsequent to September 30, 2023, KPSB and Kruger Products received consent to increase the KPSB Construction facility to \$158.3 million from \$150 million.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND OTHER INSTRUMENTS

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk of an unexpected loss if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. Kruger Products' financial instruments exposed to credit risk as of September 30, 2023 included cash and cash equivalents, restricted cash, trade and other receivables and receivables from related parties. Kruger Products places its cash and cash equivalents and restricted cash with financial institutions of high creditworthiness.

Kruger Products sells its products to a variety of customers under certain credit terms and therefore is exposed to credit risks. Normal trade receivables are due within 30 days from the invoice date and amounts in excess of 90 days past the invoice date are considered delinquent. Kruger Products routinely assesses the financial strength of its customers and mitigates against identified exposure primarily by lowering credit limits with high-risk accounts. Kruger Products' customers are well established companies and accordingly, Kruger Products has experienced limited financial loss with respect to credit risk. As a result, Kruger Products believes that its exposure to credit risk is limited.

On November 16, 2018, Kruger Products entered into a factoring arrangement with the Bank of Nova Scotia, pursuant to a Receivables Purchase Agreement, as amended by a first amendment agreement dated November 12, 2020, a second

amendment agreement dated November 8, 2021, a third amendment agreement dated November 8, 2022 and a fourth amended and restated agreement dated December 15, 2022. As a result, Kruger Products sells to the Bank of Nova Scotia eligible trade receivables owing by certain key customers with a facility limit of \$50 million. Eligible trade receivables are sold on a non-recourse basis. Kruger Products receives 95% of customer invoices sold net of a dilution factor. The dilution factor is an estimate of rebates accrued for each customer in respect of the customer invoice. Kruger Products is restricted from selling or pledging these trade receivables. The factoring arrangement bears interest at a floating interest rate based on CDOR plus applicable margin. Pursuant to the fourth amendment, the Receivables Purchase Agreement was renewed on a non-committed basis going forward, whereby either party may terminate the Receivables Purchase Agreement at any time subject to a notice period. As eligible trade receivables are sold, Kruger Products removes the factored receivables from the consolidated statement of financial position, recognizes the proceeds received as consideration for the transfer and records a loss on factoring, which is included in Interest expense and other finance costs in the unaudited condensed consolidated statement of cash flows.

Currency Risk

Currency risk is the risk that Kruger Products' earnings may fluctuate due to changes in Canadian to U.S. dollar exchange rates, as the financial results are reported in Canadian dollars. Kruger Products sells certain of its products in U.S. dollars at prevailing U.S. dollar prices. The currency exposure is more than offset by U.S. dollar costs and expenses and the U.S. dollar denominated debt.

As of September 30, 2023, Kruger Products had net liabilities denominated in U.S. dollars of \$426.5 million (September 30, 2022 - 424.9 million). Assuming the Canadian dollar strengthened (weakened) by 5% against the U.S. dollar, with all other variables held constant, the hypothetical result on net income before tax in Q3 2023 would have been an increase (decrease) of \$21.3 million (Q3 2022 - \$21.2 million).

Liquidity Risk

The purpose of liquidity risk management is to maintain sufficient cash and cash equivalents and to ensure Kruger Products has sufficient authorized credit facilities to maintain liquidity and meet its future obligations as they come due.

The ability to pay its obligations relies on Kruger Products collecting its trade receivables in a timely manner and by maintaining sufficient cash and cash equivalents in excess of anticipated needs. Kruger Products' trade and other payables of \$350.4 million as of September 30, 2023 (December 31, 2022 –\$279.4 million) are all due for payment within twelve months of the dates of the consolidated statements of financial position.

Refer to Liquidity and Capital Resources, Overview for additional details.

Interest Rate Risk

Kruger Products' interest rate risk arises from its variable rate debt related to the Kruger Products Senior Credit Facility, certain credit facilities made available as part of the TAD Sherbrooke Project Facility and the KPSB Senior Credit Facility. As of September 30, 2023, Kruger Products had variable rate debts of \$55.0 million (December 31, 2022 – \$106.9 million). The Kruger Products Senior Credit Facility bears interest at a base rate of Canadian prime rate, U.S. base rate, banker's acceptance rates, SOFR (as defined in the Kruger Products Senior Credit Agreement) or the applicable benchmark replacement rate, plus an applicable margin varying between 0.20% and 3.50%. The revolving loans of US\$10 million and \$12.5 million made available as part of the TAD Sherbrooke Project Facility bear interest at floating interest rates based on U.S. base rate, Canadian prime rate or CDOR (or the applicable replacement rate) plus an applicable margin. The KPSB Senior Credit Facility bears interest at a base rate of Canadian prime rate, LIBOR or the applicable benchmark replacement rate, banker's acceptance rates, plus a margin varying between 1.50% and 3.25%.

A 100 basis point increase (decrease) in the market rate of interest would result in an increase (decrease) in net loss before tax of \$0.5 million for YTD 2023.

Commodity Price Risk

Commodity price risk is the risk that future cash flows associated with purchasing required raw materials will fluctuate due to changes in commodity prices, which can be affected by foreign exchange and other trade related risks. Kruger Products is subject to commodity price fluctuations since Kruger Products' main raw material is fibre, which changes price due to market conditions, and therefore can result in periodic earnings volatility in the short term. Historically, the industry has generally been able to mitigate its exposure to commodity price risk over the medium term by passing increases in its supply costs onto its customers through incremental price increases, depending on the supply and demand balance. The ability to eventually pass through the full amount of pulp and other commodity cost increases can be impacted by the competitive market situation. There can be no assurance that the historical ability to pass through increases in costs will continue to occur in the future.

TRANSACTIONS WITH RELATED PARTIES

Kruger Products and Kruger are parties to a Third Amended and Restated Management Services Agreement dated as of November 15, 2019 with effect as of January 1, 2020 (the Management Services Agreement) pursuant to which Kruger provides certain management and support services to Kruger Products, including corporate management support and administrative support services; accounting and tax support; corporate financing and treasury support; benefits and human resources support services; corporate insurance; corporate procurement services complementary to Kruger Products procurement; project development and management services, corporate development support, environmental support and corporate engineering support services.

Kruger Inc. is also providing certain management and support services related to the Sherbrooke Expansion Project including project management services, and engineering, construction, accounting and corporate finance support services.

Kruger Products also leases warehouses located in Laval, Québec and New Westminster, British Columbia from an entity of which an affiliate of Kruger Inc. is a 50% owner.

Kruger Products purchases certain supplies and services from Kruger Inc. and its affiliates, including fibre and small quantities of pulp and packaging. These transactions generally take place on arm's-length terms. Kruger Products also has the ability to procure these goods and services from third party suppliers.

Goods are sold to Kruger Inc. and subsidiaries of Kruger Inc. based on the price lists in force and terms that would be available to third parties.

During YTD 2023, in connection with the contribution undertaking agreement, Kruger Products made its annual payment of \$5.8 million to Kruger Brompton L.P., a subsidiary of Kruger Inc. Also during YTD 2023, the increase in the obligation due to passage of time was \$1.8 million and was recognized as Interest expense and other finance costs in the unaudited condensed consolidated statement of income (loss).

OFF BALANCE SHEET ARRANGEMENTS AND CONTRACTUAL OBLIGATIONS

Kruger Products has entered into right-of-use lease commitments related to land, buildings, IT services, vehicles and other machines and equipment. Refer to Liquidity and Capital Resources, Contractual Obligations for additional details on contractual obligations including these right-of-use leases.

CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES

The preparation of the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements is in accordance with IFRS, which requires Kruger Products Management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures made in the Kruger Products and KPT financial statements and accompanying notes. Kruger Products Management continually evaluates the estimates and assumptions it uses. These estimates and assumptions are based on Kruger Products Management's historical experience, best knowledge of current events and conditions and activities that Kruger Products and KPT may undertake in the future. Actual results could differ materially from these estimates. The estimates and assumptions described in this section depend upon subjective or complex judgment that may be uncertain and changes in these estimates and assumptions could materially impact the financial statements. The estimates and judgement applied by Kruger Products Management that most significantly affect the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements are the same as the ones that applied to the audited consolidated financial statements of Kruger Products and KPT for the year ended December 31, 2022, except for those related to the Partnership units liability which was extinguished as a result of the Reorganization (refer to Business Highlights, Corporate Reorganization).

ACCOUNTING CHANGES AND FUTURE ACCOUNTING STANDARDS

Summary of significant accounting policies

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of the unaudited condensed financial statements of Kruger Products and KPT for the 3-month and 9-month periods ended September 30, 2023 and September 30, 2022 were disclosed in the annual audited financial statements of KPLP and KPT for the year ended December 31, 2022 and the unaudited condensed financial statements of Kruger Products and KPT for the 3-month and 6-month periods ended June 30, 2023 and June 30, 2022 and have been applied to all periods presented.

SHARE INFORMATION

KPT's authorized share capital consists of an unlimited number of KPT Common Shares. As of November 8, 2023, there were 9,963,722 KPT Common Shares issued and outstanding. Pursuant to the Exchange Agreement, Kruger Inc. has the right to exchange Kruger Products common shares it holds from time to time for KPT Common Shares on the basis of one Kruger Products common share for one KPT Common Share, subject to adjustment as set out in the Exchange Agreement. Pursuant to the Asset Purchase Agreement dated as of January 1, 2023, KPLP transferred its rights under the Exchange Agreement to Kruger Products, in connection with the Reorganization (refer to Business Highlights, Corporate Reorganization for additional details). Accordingly, if Kruger Inc. were to exchange all Kruger Products Common Shares held by it as of November 8, 2023 for KPT Common Shares, it would hold approximately 86.9% of the issued and outstanding KPT Common Shares. As of November 8, 2023, there were no potentially dilutive instruments outstanding.

Pursuant to the Shareholders' Agreement, Kruger Products is authorized to issue an unlimited number of common shares and an unlimited number of Kruger Products Common Shares. As of November 8, 2023, there were 75,973,356 Kruger Products Common Shares issued and outstanding.

The Corporations will file certifications, signed by the Corporations' CEO and CFO, with the Canadian Securities Administrators (CSA) upon filing of the Corporations' Annual Information Form. In those filings, the Corporations' CEO and CFO will certify, as required by National Instrument 52-109, the appropriateness of the financial disclosure, the design and effectiveness of the Corporations' disclosure controls and procedures and the design and effectiveness of internal controls over financial reporting. The Corporations' CEO and CFO also certify the appropriateness of the financial disclosures in the Corporations' interim filings with securities regulators. In those interim filings, the Corporations' CEO and CFO also certify the design of the Corporations' disclosure controls and procedures and the design of internal controls over financial reporting.

The Corporations' Audit Committees reviewed this MD&A and the unaudited condensed financial statements and notes of KPT and the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements and notes of Kruger Products, and the Corporations' Boards of Directors approved these documents prior to their release.

Changes in Internal Controls over Financial Reporting

There have been no changes to the Corporations' internal controls over financial reporting during Q3 2023 that have materially affected, or are reasonably expected to materially affect, its internal controls over financial reporting.
